The Creation of Mackinac

"Many, many moon ago, long before the memory of the oldest warrior's father, a great flood covered the earth. All the land of our people was submerged and every living thing was drowned except the beaver and the Great Spirit.

The Great Spirit called the beaver to him to dive and bring up some earth from the bottom of the flood. This the beaver did. From the earth Manibosho created Mackinac Island and finally the remainder of the world. He was so pleased with his work, however, that he returned to make his home at Mackinac. Here he dwelt for many years with his wife the West Wind. From them descended all of our people."

Explorers were lured to the shores of Mackinac by the fabled short passage to Cathay. In 1634, just 14 years after the Pilgrims set foot on Plymouth Rock, Jean Nicolet, French explorer and adventurer, paddled his bark covered canoe through the Straits of Mackinac. Other voyageurs soon followed. Michilimackinac, a French translation for the Indian name for the Island, means "Great Turtle." The English, who eventually ousted the French from the Island, dropped the prefix Michili to simplify the spelling.

The conclusion of the War of 1812 brought Fort Mackinac finally under control of the United States. The growing fishing and tourist industries after the Civil War brought economic vitality to Mackinac Island. However, physically the town was not able to expand much beyond its original borders. As a result, Mackinac Island retains much of its nineteenth century flavor.
