Rival says wave against Maduro is 'unstoppable'

Tens of thousands march with hope their country can 'be beautiful again'

CARACAS, Venezuela - Embattled President Nicolás Maduro confronted challenges on multiple fronts Saturday as massive anti-govern-ment rallies choked the streets, a top general defeeted, and the opposition urged European pow-ers to join the international alliance against him.

The drama-filled events underscored the s mounting on Maduro. They also suggested the strategies ahead for opposition leader an Guaidó, a 35-year-old industrial engineer, as he tries to expand Maduro's global isolation nd appeals for more Venezuekans to support

Guaidó, who heads the opposition-controlled National Assembly, has won the backing of the United States and a bost of other nations after
