The Wayfinder

There's nothing cliche about the seaside decor of this hotel, which is relaxed and stylish with cool tones and vintage elements sourced from antique markets and local artists. Tucked away from the bustling harbor, the location is ideal for travelers who wants to avoid the tourist crowds while staying within a short drive of beaches and restaurants. The lobby and its sunshine-yellow floating fireplace give off retro vibes and have plenty of seating for cocktails and unwinding after a day in the sun. The vibe by the pool — decorated with a hand-painted wave mural by Rhode Island native Sean Spellman — is cheery, and the bar serves frozen cocktails and lobster rolls. On weekends, several food trucks pull up outside the hotel, including the especially popular Del's Lemonade, a Rhode Island icon.

Where to Eat

Of course in Newport, it's all about chowda and lobsta. But several new restaurants that have popped up across the wharf are quickly becoming as beloved as the classics.

The Wayfinder's on-site restaurant and bar is a destination in itself, run by the family-owned Mission restaurant group behind Thames Street Kitchen and Mission. The all-day retro cafe with tufted banquettes serves playful takes on New England classics such as a brown-butter lobster roll with trout roe and grilled gem salad.
